2004: Our 100th Year of Caring

Dear Friend and Supporter,

What a remarkable and memorable year 2004 was for our organization. We entered the year with a heightened sense of anticipation and pride that naturally occurs when an organization reaches a major milestone: the achievement of its centenary anniversary! Six years after our move from Goffstown to the new, state-of-the-art Bedford facility, the League felt it was finally on stable financial footing and looked forward to initiating many new programs it had only heretofore dreamed of.

Unfortunately, our excitement was short-lived. In January, we faced an unanticipated challenge that was to test severely the organization's strength of purpose. A highly contagious case of ringworm had appeared in the shelter and spread quickly through the entire cat population. The Board and staff immediately consulted with other state shelters and experts in disease control. Many people advised us to solve the problem by euthanizing all infected animals. However, this "solution" was one the organization would not accept. With our century-old tradition of working to save lives and creating second chances for animals in our care, we chose instead to "do the right thing" for the animals. We decided to shut down the shelter to the public for three months and address the problem head on. Our efforts prevailed and we emerged with renewed momentum.

I can't thank enough all the people who rallied behind us and gave us their moral and financial support during that difficult time. We couldn't have made it without you.

In September, the Board completed a search for an Executive Director, a position which had been unfilled for almost six years. We all realized that we needed a leader who had proven management and financial experience and who could provide forward-looking direction. We found those qualities in our new Executive Director, Frederick H. Weismann. Fred is a seasoned banker and businessman, husband, father of four children, a recent grandfather and owner of a beagle and a League cat. He will take us to even higher levels with new insight and energy.

We're More than a Shelter.

A Year of Crisis and Pulling Together

In November 2003, the League received the surrender of two kittens infected with ringworm, a common but highly contagious fungal infection of the skin that presents itself in innumerable forms and can be difficult to diagnose. The infected kittens were isolated and a local veterinarian was contacted to establish the best treatment protocol. Within three weeks of administering the recommended treatment, the kittens showed visible improvement and were ultimately cleared for adoption. Unfortunately, it soon became evident that they were not entirely clear of the infection.

During their brief stay in the adoption area, cross-contamination occurred. Multiple aspects of the disease came into play that allowed the infection to spread rapidly.

By the end of December, we received phone calls from recent adoptive homes, letting us know that their new cats had been diagnosed with ringworm. At the same time we also began to discover some other isolated cases of ringworm in the shelter cat population. We immediately quarantined all these animals and began treatment. Within the next two weeks it became apparent that we had a more extensive problem than previously realized. At this point, the League made the decision to shut its doors to the public until we could fully assess the situation. Dr. Jean Mukherjee of the Division of Infectious Diseases at the Tufts Veterinary School of Medicine in Grafton, MA, and Dr. Vicky Scheidt, Veterinary Dermatologist from Hanover (NH) Veterinary Hospital were consulted regarding treatment protocols and recommended solutions for disease eradication.

Although there are over forty subspecies of ringworm, it was concluded that the type we were battling was *microsporum canis*, a common ringworm that is both highly contagious and zoonotic

(i.e. transferable to both humans and animals). The recommended solution required the cats and small animals to be treated externally with lime-sulfur dips and the dogs to be bathed in an anti-septic shampoo. All the animals were treated internally with an anti-fungal oral medication. The dips and baths were performed by the staff and volunteers on a rotating schedule.

Over the three month-period required to treat and cure the animal population and cleanse the facility of the spores, the League suffered a significant loss of income and incurred considerable expenditures for medication and supplies. We addressed the public's curiosity by initiating press releases and interviews to inform and educate the public on what was happening at the shelter. In March, we conducted a successful letter appeal for donations to help us through this challenging time. In April, we thankfully reopened our doors to the public and by June had regained a normal flow of visitors and adoptions.

Although the solution was difficult, uncertain and tedious, we chose treatment instead of euthanasia for the entire shelter population of over 100 animals. The rigorous and intensive protocols of cleaning and medicating were not easy to implement and sustain, but we were determined to see it through, and they have been fully incorporated into our ongoing, daily routine.

The League is forever indebted to everyone who responded to our call for assistance during this critical period in our history. As an organization, we are proud of our determination and commitment to our principals and ideals and as a result of the successful outcome, we know we are a much stronger and effective animal welfare organization.

A Year of Positive Outcomes

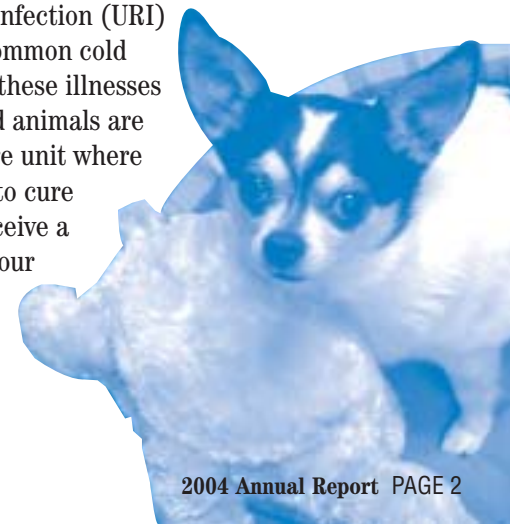
Making lifelong matches between pets and people is one of our most rewarding experiences. We spend quality time counseling adopters because we always want the right animal to go home with the right family. This past year was no exception. Despite the building being open to the public for only nine months, 596 homeless pets found new, loving homes. One of those pets, a cat we named Gracie, had been brought to us as a found stray. She arrived dragging a front right leg that was scarred, bleeding and deformed from being dragged on the ground. It was clear that the leg would have to be removed. One of our caring volunteers, Gloria McVane of Bedford, graciously offered to pay for the amputation surgery and to take Gracie into her home for the recovery period. Six weeks later, Gracie had recuperated and was returned to the shelter to be adopted. Within only a few days she was adopted into a loving new home where she happily resides today.

... Second Chance

All of the animals we receive are given the best possible medical care. In addition to our animal care staff providing examinations and vaccinations and treating minor illnesses and wounds, we

utilize Dr. Timothy Feltz and Dr. Judy LeClerc of Caring Hands Animal Hospital in Manchester to spay and neuter as many dogs, cats, kittens, puppies and rabbits as possible before they go home. For the third consecutive year, Daniel Webster Animal Hospital in Bedford and Dr. Gretchen Ham of Milford have partnered with us to generously donate their time and talents to provide care for pets that come to us severely malnourished or suffering from ailments or injuries left untreated by their owners.

Hundreds of animals come to us with minor illnesses such as feline upper respiratory infection (URI) which is similar to the common cold among people. Although these illnesses are treatable, all infected animals are housed in an isolated care unit where they receive medication to cure the illness. Once they receive a clean bill of health from our visiting veterinarians, they are transferred to the adoption area until adopted and sent home.



A Year of Giving

Helping animals is truly a team and community effort, and this year more people than ever displayed their love for animals through financial support and much-needed donations of pet food and supplies. We are truly grateful for all the support you give the animals!

Fundraising highlights in 2004:

- We received financial gifts from 1,875 individuals, businesses and foundations, totaling a record \$300,127.
- Our Centennial Dinner raised an impressive \$45,000 in a single evening when we celebrated our first century of service and thanked all our communities for their caring and support over the past ten decades.
- Our fifth annual Live and Silent Auction raised a record \$39,500.
- Our first annual Pet Step attracted 125 dog-walking participants and through pledges and donations raised over \$5,000.
- Five more people joined with many other generous people before them by including the League in their estate planning, leaving over \$136,000 in bequests.
- We received \$15,000 in grants and unrestricted support from several local, regional and national private and corporate foundations.

A Year of Compassion

As always, our volunteers showed amazing dedication and patience as they stuck with us through the ringworm crisis, which allowed us to reopen as quickly as we did. Last year, 225 volunteers donated over 7,188 hours of service to help the animals. Without our volunteers, all we do would not be possible. Our volunteers are the lifeblood of the organization. This year twelve of the volunteers each logged more than 100 hours of time donated to the shelter, with two men, Ken French and Roy Gilson, each surpassing 500 hours of volunteer time. For his invaluable and generous volunteer service, Roy was recognized by PetsMart Charities for which the League was a recipient of a \$1,000 gift in his honor.

Especially heartwarming and gratifying are the efforts initiated by our junior volunteers and the caring youth from our communities. Here are a few examples:

During our ringworm battle, Bryan Blanchard, a fifth grader at Weston School in Manchester, organized a penny drive with his classmates. They decorated coffee cans to pass around to each class in the school and collected \$322.

A group of junior volunteers held two car washes and raised \$660, qualifying for a special grant of \$300 from the Wal-Mart store in Bedford.

Three teenagers from Londonderry chose the League as their recipient of a community service project and held a book drive and sale at their church. Through their efforts, \$646 was raised and donated to the League.

Jeff Comstock of Bedford completed his Eagle Scout community project by clearing trees and brush from around the perimeter of our property and designing and building three park benches that were placed along our dog walking trails.

The young people who undertake such projects and the many volunteers who give of their time do so because of their love for animals. We are honored and appreciative that they choose us to receive their time and effort.



1st Annual Pet Step A Huge Success!

Thanks to over 125 participants and their canine companions, our 1st annual Pet Step was a great success! The one mile walk for dogs and their people raised over \$5,000 to help the homeless animals in our care.

We hope you'll join us this fall as we celebrate our 2nd annual Pet Step!

A Year of Reaching Out

Education is a powerful tool for helping animals now and in the future. We visit area schools and host youth and scout groups teaching them about pet overpopulation, responsible pet care and safety, violence prevention, respect and compassion and the role of shelters like ARL-NH. Our new Humane Education Program was supported by grants from the Bean Foundation and the Robin Colson Foundation and reached a record number of 58 classrooms and 1,200 children during the year.

Our animal behavior team works diligently, answering emails, returning phone calls and conducting training classes to keep our community pets and people together for life. Continuously updating, improving and expanding behavior services allows us to provide the latest behavior modification solutions.

Obedience Classes – Obedience training is an important part of adopting a dog. We continue to partner with Maureen Prendergast of The Crazy Canine to teach energetic pups basic obedience commands and necessary new home adjustments and to provide “first grade” and “second grade” training classes for the more mature animals. All adopters are encouraged to enter the training program and are given a 20% discount on the class fees. In 2004, 35 classes were held at the shelter for 153 puppies and dogs and their owners.

Animal Cruelty Investigations – In May we installed a dedicated Animal Cruelty Phone Line. We received 167 calls from alert members of the public, and a large percentage of those investigated involved neglect. One of the most severe types of animal cruelty cases we see is animal hoarding. In July, for example, we evacuated 48 cats from a home in Bennington and brought them to the shelter where they received immediate medical attention. Most were able to be adopted to new homes within a few months.

Such cases remind us of what trusting, enduring friendships our companion animals provide, even after being mistreated. It’s why they are so deserving of a second chance, which is what we strive to provide each and every day.

Reaching the Community – Over the past 100 years, as our organization has grown, so has our ability to reach out to pets and people beyond the walls of our facility. In the public eye, whether we are featuring homeless animals available for adoption or promoting upcoming initiatives, programs and events, we’re fortunate to have access to and the support of the local media. Twice a month we tape the For Pet’s Sake TV show, which has helped 60 animals find new homes. In addition, we are regularly invited to be on the WMUR-TV Channel 9 weekend program, where we also showcase current adoption animals. We receive tremendous response from the local community newspapers, which are always there to get out our message and promote our events and activities. Thanks to the media’s ongoing support, we’re able to educate pet owners and find new, loving families for hundreds of homeless animals.

Throughout each year, we host or participate in a variety of events both on-site and off-site. This past year we were involved in 34 events at both the shelter and out in our communities. With each event, we boost the public’s awareness of our programs and services and expose adoptable animals to potential new owners. The Petco stores in Manchester and Nashua provide space each month for our information and exhibit table, and we are regularly invited to attend adoption days Petco hosts throughout the year.
